
Lending Library

Birch Lake Association Shoreline Restoration Initiative



The Initiative aims to improve the health of Birch Lake shoreline, sustaining a year-by-year progression toward restoration, following these priorities:

Shoreline Zone: Improve this critical buffer zone, using native plants and shrubs, erosion control, and eliminate the need for mowing, pesticides or fertilizers.

Upland Zone: Continue improvement by adding native plants, shrubs and trees. Minimize area requiring mowing. Reduce or eliminate pesticides and fertilizers in this zone.

Aquatic Zone: Maintain the natural aquatic plants to prevent further damage from development..

Why Restore the Shoreline?

Lake-Scaping" and shoreland restoration have many benefits for your shoreline property:

- Meet your expectations for your property, while preserving the quality of Birch Lake
- Filter out pollutants and runoff that degrade lake water quality
- Prevent shoreline erosion
- Provide habitat for native wildlife
- Enjoy nature: flowers, shrubs, trees, aquatic plants, fish, insects, birds
- More leisure time to relax and enjoy life at Birch Lake, with less time mowing.

Minimizing lawns near the lake will reduce shoreline erosion, algal blooms, and excessive aquatic plant growth. Lawns are shallow-rooted, provide very little wildlife habitat, need frequent maintenance, and are often over-fertilized

How do I Improve my Shoreline?

We are inviting all Birch Lake property owners to take the Minnesota Lakes and Rivers Advocates (MLR) Score your Shore mini-assessment.

The Survey takes only a few minutes to complete, and shows which factors affect the health of your shoreline.

Notice which questions have the biggest impact on your total. Also, you can see your score without submitting your information to the MLR, if you have confidentially concerns. The MLR is providing best practices and resources among many lake associations in Minnesota.

A LITTLE BIT OF HISTORY

In 1894, the Northern Minnesota Railroad built tracks along the wagon road, through Brainerd, Pine River and Hackensack to the now-extinct town of Lothrop along the east side of Ten Mile Lake. The racks ended At Lothrup. Trainloads of logs were sent from the surrounding area to St. Cloud where they were sent down the Mississippi.

Lothrop was first platted in 1895 and was named for Luther



R. Lothrop, a civil engineer from Maine. The village was located slightly south of the point where County Road #50 meets Highway #371. In 1893, the Minnesota Logging Company began using the townsite as their headquarters. The winter of 1895-96 was one of great activity; nearly 2000 men were in the area and nearly \$100,000 was paid in wages, the greater part of which was spent in Lothrop. As one old-timer said, "The first time I ever struck Lothrop, the population consisted of about a thousand men, 900 of whom were drunk and the other 100 were fighting to get to the bar." Lothrop was a lumberjack's paradise. Trains, loaded with logs for southern mills, clattered through Lothrop every 15 to 20 minutes. The village had a railroad station and repair shop, three hotels, several stores, one house of ill repute, one saloon and a drug store run by Dr. Wallace J. Baine, the first postmaster appointed on December 22, 1894. Dr. Baine, it was rumored, sold the "stuff" to make them sick and then doctored them until they became well, but if it was too late, he could also pronounce them dead and decide the cause of their death as he was also the coroner. Pete Denis owned the general store. George Stanley was proprietor of the City Hotel, Fred Long owned the City Hotel Bar, Alfred Parker owned a general store. Sisler and Cowan owned the Bodega Saloon on Columbian Avenue. Michael McNichols ran the Gem Sample Room, Mrs. L. Curo owned a general store. Her husband, James, came to the Hackensack area in the 1870s. John Gillis was a lawyer, A. J. Wilson and Sam Hatfield were barbers. A weekly newspaper, The Leech Lake Letter, was published in Lothrup from October 1, 1895 until December 5, 1895. (Yes, those dates are correct) Local legends abound - such as the tragic "Moustache Liz," a lady-of-the-night from Lothrop, north of Hackensack, who was bet and lost in a poker game, married to the man who won her, and widowed when he was hit by a train while oput chasing his pigs.

In 1896 a railroad trestle was built across Shingobee Island and lumber operations moved northward. By 1900, the town was deserted. Most of the residents moved north to Walker, west to Akeley or south to Hackensack. Dr. Baine put up a new hotel in Akeley; Pete Denis moved to Hackensack, and all that remained was the bordello and Mustache Liz. Hackensack, in Birch Lake Township, was named for an earlier post office there established in 1888, which derived its name from the town of Hackensack in New Jersey, on the Hackensack River, given by James Curo and Bye Barlett.

Legend says chose the name because the mosquitos were as numerous and big as those in their hometown. Hackensack was incorporated as a village on June 5, 1903 and separated from the township on May 18, 1911. Hackensack had a station of the Minnesota and International Railway. In 2003 Hackensack celebrated it's 100th Anniversary. The community celebrated by publishing a book about the town's history, including the businesses, schools, resorts and people. It's a terrific peek into the past, there are still a few copies available at the Chamber Building in town.
